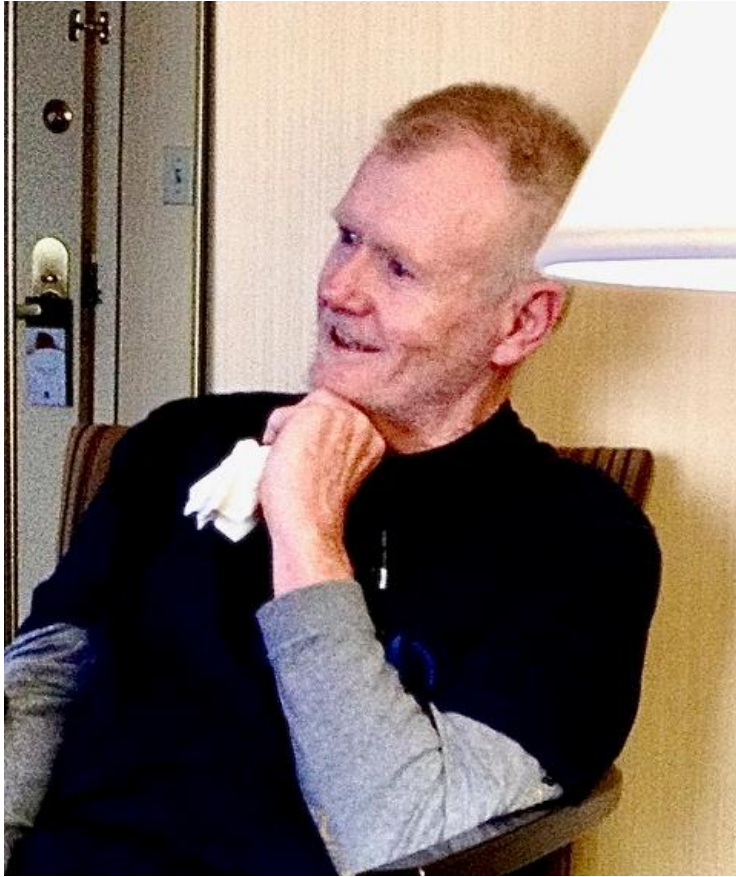


Boston University Baseball Mourns the Passing of Alumni George Scanlon

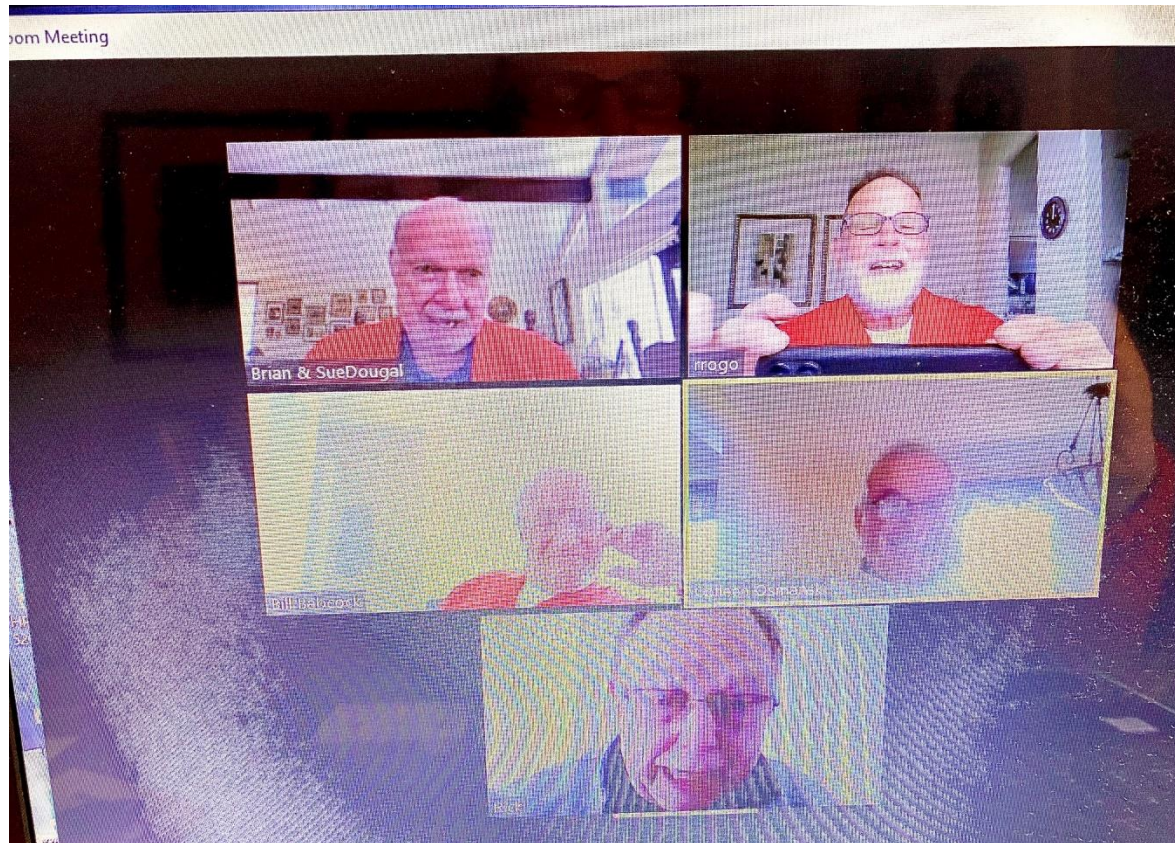

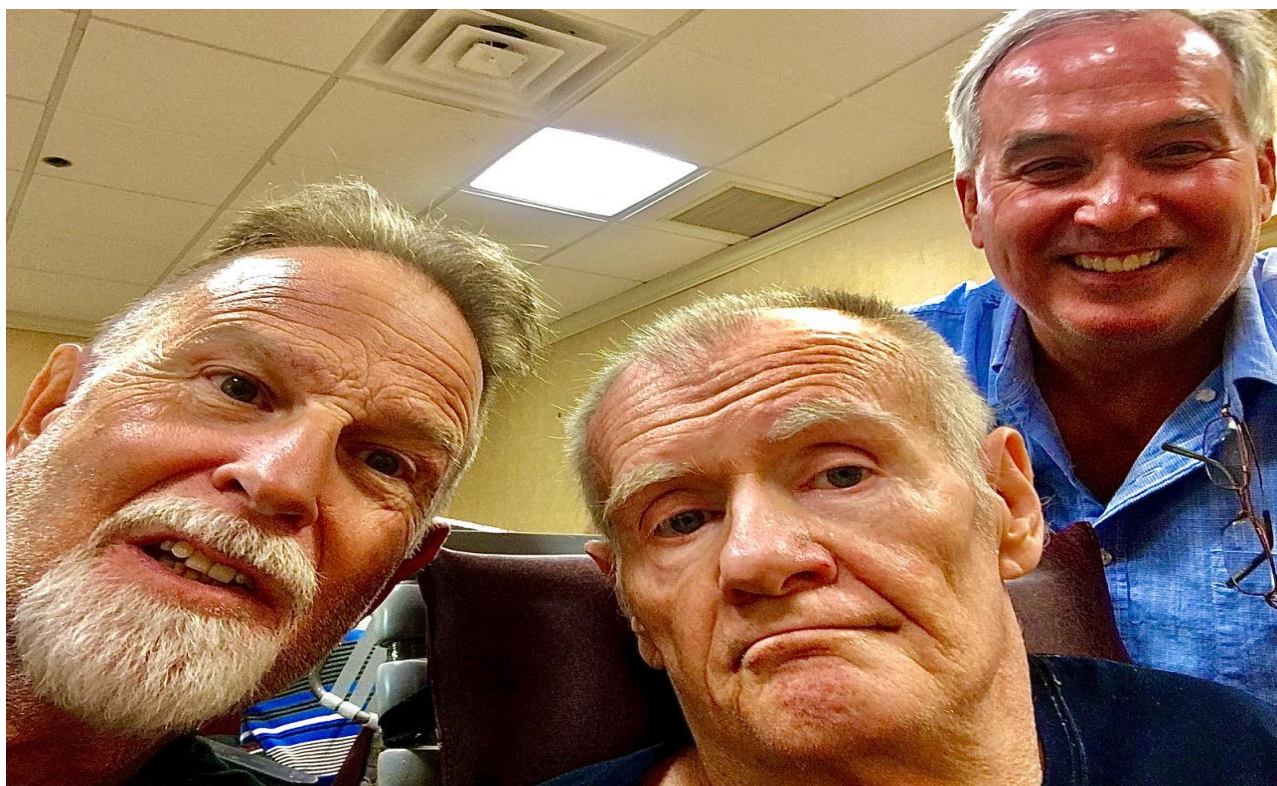

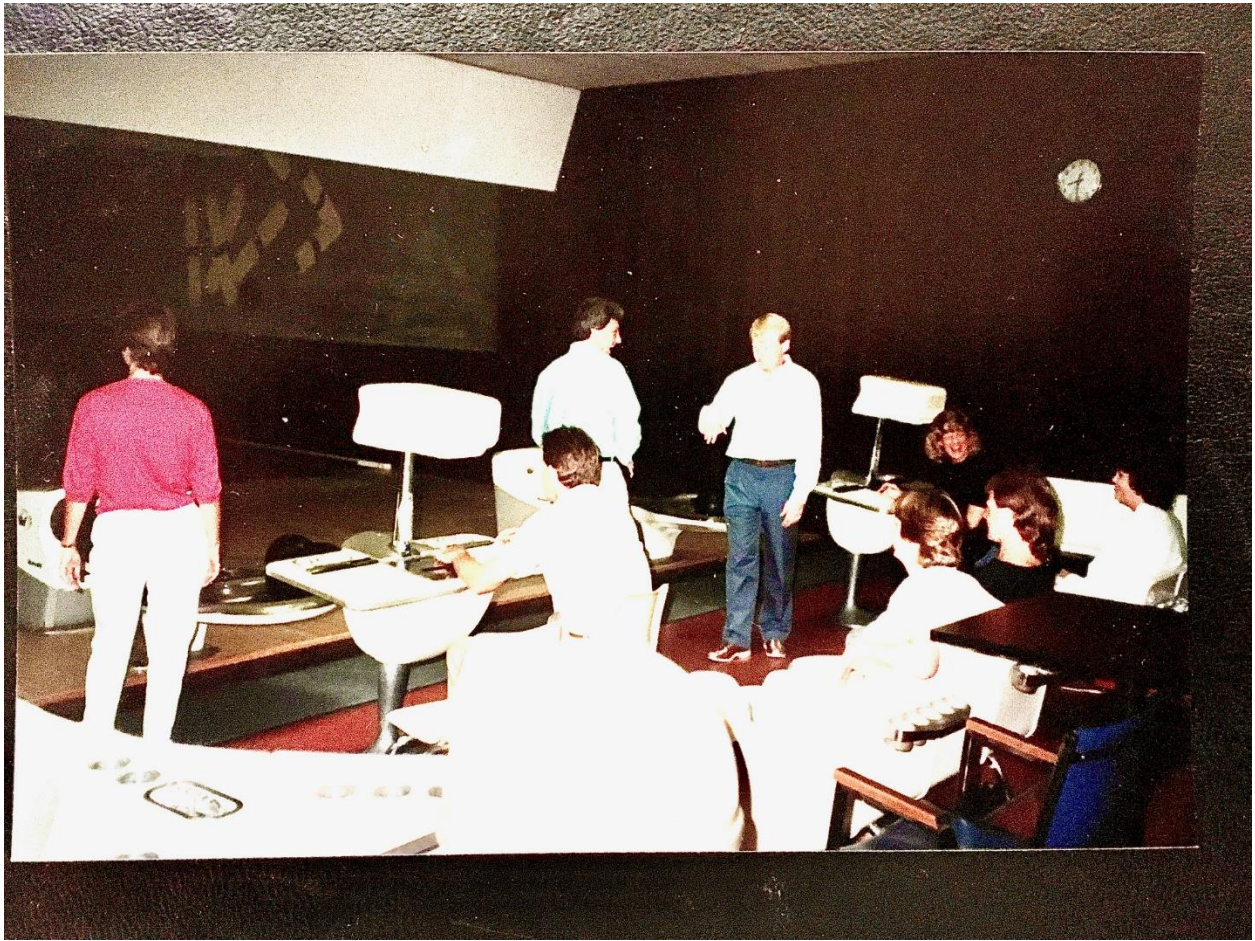

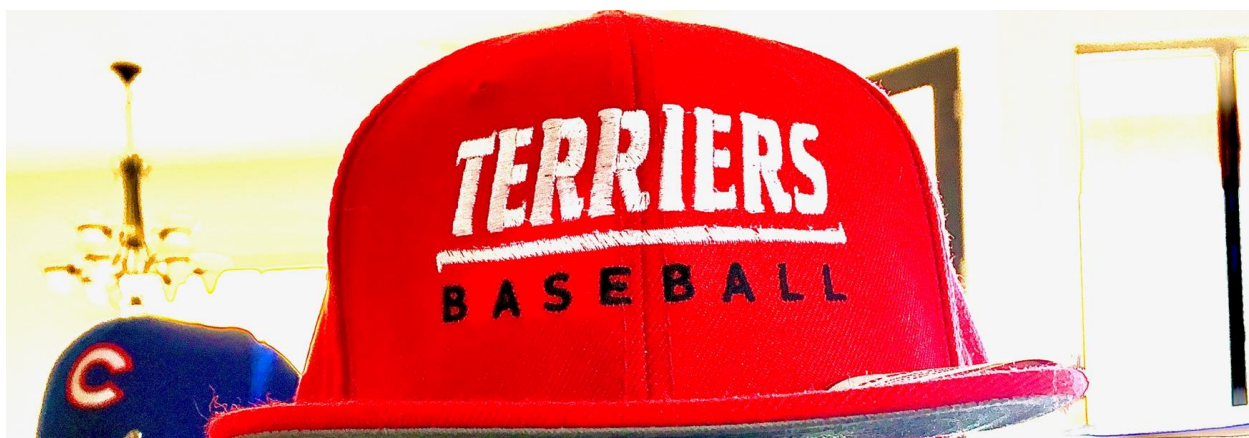

BC Tips Tufts, BU Belts Brandeis

Boston College broke open a tie game with three unearned runs in the eighth inning to defeat Tufts, 6-3, yesterday and improve its record to 4-3.

Sophomore righthander Gary Beckett got the victory with relief help in the ninth from Frank Worthington. Bill Bedard, Jay Brennan and Ned Yetten each collected two hits.

BOSTON UNIVERSITY belted winless Brandeis, 12-3, behind the pitching of right-hander Kenny Wnuk who scattered

eight hits. Saul Weiss drove in three runs with a pair of hits and Chuck Hohl had two hits and an RBI for the winners, now 3-5.

Bill Furze and Art Hunt each collected three runs batted in as Boston State clobbered Lowell State, 15-1, in a game called after five innings because of rain. Senior right-hander Fran Stanford limited the losers to two hits. Both teams are now 2-3.

Providence scored a come-

back victory over Stonehill, 3-2, with an unearned run providing the margin of victory. Steve Carrera singled home Larry Thomas, who had reached on an error, for the

winning run in the sixth inning. Stonehill, now 2-4-1, got its runs in the first inning on a two-run single by Ray Mooney.
